#### Significant Debris Removal

The Florida Division of Emergency
Management (FDEM) has removed a massive
amount of debris, including over four million
cubic yards of upland debris and nearly
931,000 cubic yards of wet debris.

#### **Addressing Housing Needs**

SBP, Inc. has 133 homes allocated to its SHRC pipeline. Currently, 66 homes were assigned to contractors. SBP, Inc. has completed 6 repairs of homes, 14 individuals in total. SBP, Inc. currently has 4 homes in construction, 19 are being prepped and 9 are in the process of a final walkthrough with three statecertified subcontractors onboarded.







The organizations provided essential services such as debris removal, expedient home repairs, route clearance, and meal provision.








